Ms. MOORE of Wisconsin (for herself and Mr. MFUME) introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on the Judiciary

A BILL

To encourage, enhance, and integrate Green Alert plans throughout the United States, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the “Corey Adams Search-
5 light Act”.

6 SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.

7 In this Act:

8 (1) MISSING VETERAN.—The term “missing
9 veteran” means an individual who—

(A) is reported to, or identified by, a law enforcement agency as a missing person;

3 (B) is a veteran; and

13 (3) GREEN ALERT.—The term “Green Alert”
14 means an alert issued through the Green Alert com-
15 munications network, related to a missing veteran.

21 SEC. 3. GREEN ALERT COMMUNICATIONS NETWORK.

22 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Attorney General shall, sub-
23 ject to the availability of appropriations, establish a na-
24 tional communications network, to be known as the Green
25 Alert communications network, within the Department of

1 Justice to provide assistance to regional and local search
2 efforts for missing veterans through the initiation, facilita-
3 tion, and promotion of local elements of the network (re-
4 ferred to in this Act as “Green Alert plans”), in coordina-
5 tion with States, federally or State recognized Tribes,
6 units of local government, law enforcement agencies, the
7 Department of Veterans Affairs, and other concerned enti-
8 ties with expertise in providing services to veterans.

9 (b) COORDINATION WITH AMBER ALERT NETWORK
10 AND OTHER ALERT NETWORKS.—In establishing the
11 Green Alert communications network under subsection
12 (a), the Attorney General shall work with States to ensure,
13 when feasible, the Green Alert communications network
14 is able to operate in coordination with a State’s existing
15 AMBER Alert communications network, established under
16 subtitle A of title III of the PROTECT Act (34 U.S.C.
17 20501 et seq.), and any other State alert networks, to
18 maximize the efficiency of all such alert systems, and to
19 prevent overuse or improper activations of such networks.

20 **SEC. 4. GREEN ALERT COORDINATOR.**

21 (a) NATIONAL COORDINATOR WITHIN DEPARTMENT
22 OF JUSTICE.—The Attorney General shall designate an
23 individual of the Department of Justice to act as the na-
24 tional coordinator of the Green Alert communications net-
25 work. The individual so designated shall be known as the

1 Green Alert Coordinator of the Department of Justice (re-
2 ferred to in this Act as the “Coordinator”).

3 (b) DUTIES OF THE COORDINATOR.—In acting as the
4 national coordinator of the Green Alert communications
5 network, the Coordinator shall—

6 (1) work with States and Tribal governments to
7 encourage the development of additional Green Alert
8 plans in the network;

9 (2) assess the ability of each State to imple-
10 ment Green Alerts, including the ability and re-
11 sources available to each State to broadcast such
12 alerts;

13 (3) establish voluntary guidelines for States to
14 use in developing Green Alert plans that will pro-
15 mote compatible and integrated Green Alert plans
16 throughout the United States, including—

17 (A) a list of the resources necessary to es-
18 tablish a Green Alert plan;

19 (B) criteria for evaluating whether a situa-
20 tion warrants issuing a Green Alert, taking into
21 consideration the need to prevent overuse or de-
22 sensitization to such alerts, including criteria to
23 determine—

24 (i) whether the mental or physical ca-
25 pacity of a veteran who is missing, and the

12 (C) a description of the appropriate uses of
13 the Green Alert name to readily identify the na-
14 ture of search efforts for missing veterans; and

1 turn of the veteran to family, guardian, or domicile,
2 as appropriate, including—

- 3 (A) public safety communications protocol;
- 4 (B) case management protocol;
- 5 (C) command center operations;
- 6 (D) reunification protocol; and
- 7 (E) incident review, evaluation, debriefing,
8 and public information procedures;

9 (5) work with States and Tribal governments to
10 ensure appropriate regional coordination of various
11 elements of the network;

12 (6) establish an advisory board to assist States,
13 Tribal governments, units of local government, law
14 enforcement agencies, and other entities involved in
15 the Green Alert communications network with initi-
16 ating, facilitating, and promoting Green Alert plans,
17 which shall include—

18 (A) to the maximum extent practicable,
19 representation from the various geographic re-
20 gions of the United States; and

21 (B) members who are—
22 (i) representatives of veteran advocacy
23 groups, law enforcement agencies, and
24 public safety communications;

(ii) broadcasters, first responders, dispatchers, and radio station personnel;

(iv) federally recognized tribes or tribes recognized by the State; and

17 (c) COORDINATION.—

18 (1) COORDINATION WITH OTHER AGENCIES.—

19 The Coordinator shall coordinate and consult with
20 the Secretary of Transportation, the Federal Com-
21 munications Commission, the Secretary of Veterans
22 Affairs, Secretary of the Interior, and other appro-
23 priate offices of the Department of Justice in car-
24 rying out activities under this Act.

7 (d) ANNUAL REPORTS.—Not later than one year
8 after the date of enactment of this Act, and annually
9 thereafter, the Coordinator shall submit to Congress a re-
10 port on the activities of the Coordinator and the effective-
11 ness and status of the Green Alert plans of each State
12 that has established or is in the process of establishing
13 such a plan. Each such report shall include—

14 (1) a list of States that have established Green
15 Alert plans;

(A) the number of Green Alerts issued;

(C) the number of individuals located successfully;

(D) the average period of time between the issuance of a Green Alert and the location of the individual for whom such Alert was issued;

(E) the State, local, or Tribal agencies or authorities issuing Green Alerts, and the process by which Green Alerts are disseminated;

(G) the criteria used by the State to determine whether to issue a Green Alert; and

(H) the extent to which missing individuals
for whom Green Alerts were issued crossed
State lines;

(6) any other information the Coordinator determines to be appropriate.

1 SEC. 5. MINIMUM STANDARDS FOR ISSUANCE AND DIS-

2 SEMINATION OF ALERTS THROUGH GREEN

3 ALERT COMMUNICATIONS NETWORK.

4 (a) ESTABLISHMENT OF MINIMUM STANDARDS.—

5 Subject to subsection (b), the Coordinator, in consultation

6 with the Department of Veterans Affairs and the Advisory

7 Committee, shall establish minimum standards for—

8 (1) the issuance of alerts through the Green

9 Alert communications network; and

10 (2) the extent of the dissemination of alerts

11 issued through the network.

12 (b) LIMITATIONS.—

13 (1) VOLUNTARY PARTICIPATION.—The min-

14 imum standards established under subsection (a) of

15 this section, and any other guidelines and programs

16 established under section 4, shall be adoptable on a

17 voluntary basis only.

18 (2) DISSEMINATION OF INFORMATION.—The

19 minimum standards shall, to the maximum extent

20 practicable (as determined by the Coordinator in

21 consultation with State, Tribal government, and

22 local law enforcement agencies), provide that appro-

23 priate information relating to the special needs of a

24 missing veteran (including health care needs) are

25 disseminated to the appropriate law enforcement,

26 public health, and other public officials.

1 (3) GEOGRAPHIC AREAS.—The minimum stand-
2 ards shall, to the maximum extent practicable (as
3 determined by the Coordinator in consultation with
4 State and local law enforcement agencies), provide
5 that the dissemination of an alert through the Green
6 Alert communications network be limited to the geo-
7 graphic areas which the missing veteran could rea-
8 sonably reach, considering the missing veteran's cir-
9 cumstances and physical ability, the modes of trans-
10 portation available to the missing veteran, and the
11 circumstances of the disappearance.

12 (4) PRIVACY AND CIVIL LIBERTIES PROTEC-
13 TIONS.—The minimum standards shall—

14 (A) ensure that alerts issued through the
15 Green Alert communications network comply
16 with all applicable Federal, State, and local pri-
17 vacy laws and regulations; and

18 (B) include standards that specifically pro-
19 vide for the protection of the privacy and sen-
20 sitive medical information of missing veterans.

21 (5) STATE AND LOCAL VOLUNTARY COORDINA-
22 TION.—In carrying out the activities under sub-
23 section (a), the Coordinator may not interfere with
24 the current system of voluntary coordination be-
25 tween local broadcasters and State and local law en-

1 forcement agencies for purposes of the Green Alert
2 communications network.

3 **SEC. 6. TRAINING AND OTHER RESOURCES.**

4 The Coordinator shall make available to States, Trib-
5 al governments, units of local government, law enforce-
6 ment agencies, and other concerned entities that are in-
7 volved in initiating, facilitating, or promoting Green
8 Alerts, including broadcasters, first responders, dis-
9 patchers, public safety communications personnel, and
10 radio station personnel—

11 (1) training and educational programs related
12 to the Green Alert communications network and the
13 capabilities, limitations, and anticipated behaviors of
14 missing veterans, which shall be updated regularly to
15 encourage the use of new tools, technologies, and re-
16 sources in Green Alert plans;

17 (2) informational materials, including bro-
18 chures, videos, posters, and websites to support and
19 supplement such training and educational programs;

20 (3) support, using funding authorized under
21 section 7, to create or integrate such Green alerts
22 into an existing State alert system;

23 (4) funding, using funds authorized under sec-
24 tion 7, for a full-time State Green Alert Coordinator
25 to carry out the State's Green Alert Plan; and

1 (5) other assistance, as determined appropriate
2 by the Coordinator, to support the purposes of this
3 Act.

4 **SEC. 7. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE**
5 **GREEN ALERT COMMUNICATIONS NETWORK.**

6 There are authorized to be appropriated to the Attor-
7 ney General \$3,000,000 to carry out the Green Alert com-
8 munications network as authorized under this Act. States
9 receiving assistance under this program must submit a
10 Green Alert Plan containing any information that the Co-
11 ordinator shall require. Such plan must include a descrip-
12 tion of how they intend to coordinate with other Alert sys-
13 tems in the State and work with Tribal governments in
14 the State.
